Please note that students taking Pre-Calculus at their transfer institution must complete BOTH Pre-Calculus I and Pre-Calculus II to satisfy admission requirement for the psychology major.

Psychology prerequisites must have a minimum 2.0 grade in each class and a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 for three PSYCH courses. Admission is competitive. Meeting the above criteria does not guarantee admission to the department.
