Application Deadline: Complete applications are due by 5 p.m. on the first day of spring quarter for the following autumn quarter.

Non-UW students may register for the prerequisite courses (L ARCH 300, 352, 353) as a non-matriculated student through UW Professional and Continuing Education.

Additional Requirements: To apply to the BLA program at the start of spring quarter, students will need to have taken the prerequisite courses and a minimum of 60 credits of General Education coursework. Students looking to complete the degree in seven quarters should complete all departmental General Education requirements prior to starting the degree. L ARCH 300 and LARCH courses not required within the BLA program may count in the General Education requirements. Drawing and painting courses are encouraged and will help prepare for a required portfolio submission in the application process. Exposure to computer animation (Adobe Suite: Photoshop, Illustrator, InDesign; Sketch-Up; CAD, Rhino) are helpful.
